Dear Member -

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Its that time of year again when we try to find the receipt which proves we paid/donated such and such a sum which is tax deductible. Don't forget that your subs. for this Association are deductible — under the Item "Trade Union etc. Subscriptions" !!

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The Consumer Price Index for the quarter ended 31st March was reduced to 0.4%, due mainly to the effects of Medicare reducing the official cost of living. The annual increase to 31st March fell from 11.4% last year to 5.9% this year.

However to 31 December the C.P.I. had risen to over 8%, so in the last issue we forecast that the percentage increase in our superannuation, because of indexation, would <u>probably</u> be about 8.5%. We now believe that it will increase by only 5.9% so don't go out and buy a Rolls Royce!. In early July the Commissioner will formally advise you of the exact increase and of your new fortnightly and annual entitlement — which of course will now be reduced by the full 1% Medicare levy.

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Also in our last issue we mentioned the possibility of some function between the A.G.M. and our Christmas Luncheon. The A.G.M. left the matter to the Executive, and it has now been decided to hold such a function, which will take the form of a get-together on Monday 9th July at which Dame Rachel Cleland's long awaited book would be launched by Mr. Andrew Peacock. Full details are set out on a later page.

P.N.G. News - from the Consul-General's office, Sydney -

'First Contact' (mentioned in an earli er issue), the award winning film of the first contact of Europeans with the Highland people of PNG, was nominated for an Oscar in this year's Academy Awards. The PNG made film 'Tukana' is one of 19 feature films from 14 countries to be shown at the 13th Annual New Directors/New Film Festival. 'Tukana' was produced by the North Solomons Provincial Government and Institute of PNG Studies.

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Sir Buri Kidu has been re-appointed as Chancellor to the University of PNG and Rose Kekedo as Pro-Chancellor. (Older Members will remember Rose as one of the Kekedo family from Kokoda - younger ones will know her as a school teacher and later as a departmental head..Ed.)

WOMENS DAY. Mrs. Nahau Rooney, the only female among 109 members of Parliament, convinced her colleagues that there should be a Public Holiday for Women every March 24th. Mrs. Rooney said women wanted their men to acknowledge they were mothers. She said that PNG should be proud of the women's role in participating with the men to bring about development in the country.

Police are considering using breathalyzers in an attempt to cut down alcoholassociated road accidents. The 1982 Police Report listed 699 cases of driving under the influence of liquor for that year. The Chief Superintendant of Traffic and Director of Traffic visited Australia to assess the breathalyzers' use.

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Niugini Mining Ltd. believes its discoveries of a big bulk low grade gold deposit on Lihir Island, N.E. of Rabaul could be part of a chain of volcanic gold-bearing islands stretching over 1,000km. from Bougainville to Manus Island.

PNG is optimistic that it will increase rice production by more than 600 tonnes this year.

The Government has launched its new White Paper on Industrial Development. It includes Tax deductions of up to 40% of the minimum wage per employee, changes in depreciation allowance systems, extending the present export incentive scheme, cut rate power, registration of company regardless of local shareholding.

HYDRO SCHEME. The Commonwealth Development Corporation will help finance Elcom's \$33M Rouna 4 Hydro Scheme near Port Moresby. Rouna 4 will have a capacity to produce 13.5m.w. of power. Electricity will cost another 5% less from June. More decreases could be made over the next three years. Reductions are possible because of good rainfall for the Hydro Power and cost cutting measures in Elcom.

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P.N.G. news continued -

GAMES SPONSOR. Rothmans of Pall Mall (PNG) Pty. Ltd. will sponsor the 14 member PNG Olympic Games contingent this year. The sponsorship will be worth \$42,000.

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OK TEDI. With the Ok Tedi mine coming into production the next 12 months will see PNG become the world's third largest producer, after South Africa and USSR.

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END OF AN ERA. In June 1964 the 64 members of the first House of Assembly met for the first time in the original Parliament House in Moresby. The building was the old European Hospital, which many Members will remember either as patients or visitors. On March 16, Parliament transferred to the new Parliament House in Waigani. The building - which is an eye-opener - will be officially opened by Prince Charin August.

### MINUTES OF THE 33rd. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Meeting opened 1205 p.m.

The President welcomed the 75 Members and visitors present and read all apologies received.

As copies of the Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting had been circulated at this Meeting and previously published in "Una Voce" it was proposed that they be accepted.

Moved: Mr. Williams, seconded: Mr. Rudge. carried.

The President presented his Report.

"Welcome to our AGM 1983/84 - its good to see so many Members and locals. I do not propose to speak at length but am proud of such a successful group as ours. My thanks must go to our executive, and one of our strengths is our Newsletter. Editor Fred Kaad gathers and writes the material, Pam Foley puts it together and types it, Les Clout gets it to the printer and is responsible for the subsequent sorting and preparation for posting, and Harry West keeps an able executive finger in the pie. Treasurer Gabriel Keleny keeps a supervisory eye on all financial activities and must be congratulated for the really fine balance sheet he has presented. Your Committee meets regularly and I thank them for their time given up for these meetings. I also wish to speak of a non-member of the Committee who when Members were a little tardy in advising of their attendance for today's meeting 'stirred up the pot'. The passing of Sir John Gunther is recorded in 'Vale'. Obituaries were published in major newspapers and periodicals but much remains for historians to say when his work can be appreciated in perspective. One of the aspects which also should be remembered was his influence on the development of organised sport in PNG. His enthusiastic acceptance of the idea of a South Pacific Games, his strong and continuing support for the establishment of the national sporting associations, so necessary for world recognition and acceptance, had its fruition in our entry into the international arena in the Commonwealth Games at Perth in 1962 and then the Second South Pacific Games in Moresby. As a long time associate and friend I find it difficult to be objective about John Thomson Gunther, but I commend to Members the words of Les Johnson in the 'Canberra Times' of 30/4/84:

"John Thomson Gunther was undoubtedly the outstanding public servant in Papua New Guinea's post-war colonial history.

He exercised a dominant influence on Papua New Guinea development during his service there, first as Director of Public Health from 1946 to 1956, then as Assistant Administrator until 1966, and finally as foundation Vice-Chancellor of the University of Papua New Guinea 1966-72.

Paul Hasluck, Minister for Territories from 1951 to 1963, wrote of him, "I know of no-one who, in successive capacities, did better work for Papua New Guinea in the post-war years than John Gunther did."

He was born in Sydney on October 2, 1910, attended The King's School, Parramatta, and graduated in medicine from Sydney University. He also held diplomas in tropical medicine and tropical health and his first experience of tropical conditions was in the Solomon Islands before the war. During World War II he served in the RAAF, first as a malariologist and later as commanding officer of the First Tropical Research Field Unit. After the war he joined the reconstituted Addministration of Papua New Guinea and began a long career of service to the people of that country.

He was appointed Director of Public Health in 1946 where his drive, allied to a charismatic personality, was responsible for the rapid development of health services throughout Papua New Guinea. He instituted effective programs for the control of malaria and tuberculosis and vigorously implemented a graduated system of health care. At the base of it were simple village procedures to control common and debilitating diseases by the widespread use of aid-post orderlies (doktabois), village men with sufficient rudimentary training to administer a range of simple remedies for the most common maladies. More serious problems requiring constant care were brought to centres presided over by medical assistants, (liklik doktas), while the seriously ill proceeded further up the chain to district and regional hospitals where specialist services were available from fully qualified staff. With this was associated the development of training opportunities for PNG nationals at all levels of the health service to the community. Paul Hasluck, in 1956, wrote, "The achievement of the Health Department in post-war years has been little short of 'amazing'."

Early in John Gunther's tenure of office he was faced with a catastrophic medical emergency when Mount Lamington in Northern Papua erupted with a Peléean-type explosion, incinerating more than 3,000 of the surrounding inhabitants and greviously injuring many more. It was a situation which required all of Gunther's drive and organisational skills in assisting to cope with the greatest natural disaster in Australasian history.

In 1957 a position of Assistant Administrator was created to cope with the increasing demands of the expanding PNG Administration. Gunther was appointed and began an active role in all aspects of PNG administration. His tenure of office was a period of dynamic growth in which he played a major role. He became the dominant individual in PNG affairs and nowhere was this felt more strongly than in the field of political development. He was the Leader in the Legislative Council and chairman of the select committee which recommended the creation of a parliament to be elected by universal suffrage. When that House of Assembly was established in 1964 he was its Leader and in a large sense its creator.

The early 1960s was also a time of rapid educational development and of pressure for opportunities for Papua New Guineans to play a larger role in the management of their country's affairs. The need for facilities for higher education was widely canvassed, and, to examine the problems, Hasluck appointed a commission consisting of Sir George Currie, Professor Oskar Spate and Dr. John Gunther. Out of this came the recommendation to establish a university and an institute of higher technical education, accepted somewhat belatedly by a new Minister for Territories, C.E. Barnes.

A fruitful partnership between Hasluck, a minister who knew what he wanted, and Gunther, who could deliver, ended before Hasluck could pursue his intention to appoint Gunther as Secretary of the Department of Territories. Barnes preferred an officer from the Commonwealth Department of Trade and Gunther's disappointment had some bearing on later events.

With the acceptance of the recommendation to proceed with two tertiary education institutions, interim councils were set up and foundation leaders for them were sought. It soon became apparent that the successful establishment of a university in Papua New Guinea would need someone of unusual vision, of wide experience beyond the confines of orthodox academia, a person of dogged determination and one who was a skilled bureaucratic infighter. The council could see but one person who filled these requirements and Gunther accepted the offer of the position of foundation Vice-Chancellor. With characteristic energy he lobbied, harried and cajoled his previous colleagues, bulldozed the obstacles and presided over the phoenix-like rise of a fine institution.

I believe that more than anything else, John Gunther would regard the University of Papua New Guinea as his principal monument for posterity. It was the culmination of his work for better health, better administration, better education and ultimately better capacity for Papua New Guineans to take control of their own destiny.

creasing health problems, which had plagued him almost throughout his PNG service, caused his retirement to live in Australia in 1972, but he pursued an active interest in PNG affairs until his death.

John Gunther's service to Papua New Guinea and to Australia has been recognised by awards of OBE, the CMG in 1965 and a knighthood in 1975. He has also been the recipient of honorary doctorates from the University of Papua New Guinea and from Monash and Sydney Universities.

He is remembered with pride by his wife Dot, a son, three daughters and five grandchildren.
